Financial

TREASURER'S REPORT

The George Eastman Museum ended fiscal year 2020 with total assets of \$54.4 million, including \$37.5 million in long-term investments, \$12.8 million in net fixed assets, and \$4.1 million in cash, pledges and grants receivable, and other current assets. Total net assets increased by \$3.9 million from year-end 2019. In keeping with standard museum practice, the George Eastman Museum does not capitalize its collections.

The George Eastman Museum reported revenue *without* donor restrictions of \$13.2 million in 2020. Of this, earned income was \$900,00 and endowment draws to support operations were \$2.3 million. The pooled endowment investments had a return of 18.4%. As in 2019, the museum continued to decrease the amount of the endowment draw to cover operating expenses.

The accompanying summaries summarize the George Eastman Museum's financial position and performance for 2020. The financial statements are audited by the accounting firm DeJoy, Knauf & Blood LLP, and copies of the audited financial statements may be obtained free of charge by calling or writing the George Eastman Museum's Vice President for Finance and Operations.
